Welcome to the WorldSkills Competition

The WorldSkills Competition is the biggest skills competition in the world and is held every two years in one of its member countries. It sets world class standards in over 40 skill categories ranging from cabinet making to web design. Over four days of tough competition, young people drawn from 48 member nations test themselves against tough international standards. The ultimate prizes are gold, silver and bronze medals. The scale of the event is unrivalled. Over 800 competitors take part. Their progress is keenly watched by thousands of visitors who include young people, policy makers, government representatives, employers, teachers, trainers and experts from around the world.

For all the young people who take part it is an invaluable, unique learning experience. Many of the competitors go on to act as ambassadors for their skills and promote excellence in vocational education and training in their own countries. Competing at the highest level in a WorldSkills competition builds the skills and confidence of competitors, leading to better career prospects and personal development. For employers of a competitor, their support for the competition is proven to attract an increased number of highly skilled job applicants to the business.

In the UK, short-listed competitors are drawn over several years from a series of national skills competitions coordinated by UK Skills. They are then invited to take part in a series of 'play off' events. These events are designed to simulate the WorldSkills Competition, so judges can observe how well competitors perform under pressure and in the public eye, during 18 hours of intense competition.

Once selected the competitors attend generic training events throughout the year to prepare for the rigours of the WorldSkills Competition as well as training and competitions to further develop their technical skills.

WorldSkills London 2011

In May 2006 the UK bid team beat fierce competition in Melbourne to host WorldSkills 2011 in London. The successful London 2011 Competition provides an UK bid represents the strong collaboration between the four Administrations of the UK Government: England; Scotland; Northern Ireland; and Wales, and won with vocational skills. an outright majority over the other bidding nations, Australia and Sweden.

Whilst the UK has a strong economy and world-leading employment levels, to maintain this position, the UK recognises that the development of skills is fundamental. The 2011 event will be a key tool in promoting skills and up-skilling the nation. This was highlighted in the Leitch Review of Skills, published in December 2006.

WorldSkills London 2011 is now an integral part of the government's National Skills Strategy providing a catalyst for change and creating a high profile demonstration of the levels of excellence that can be achieved in vocational skills. Other WorldSkills member countries are now looking to raise the sights of their own governments to match those of the UK.




Supporting the WorldSkills London 2011 event:
