UK in 37 skills at WorldSkills London 2011

The journey from Team UK to WorldSkills

Team UK's journey to WorldSkills started with competitors taking part in WorldSkills UK National Competitions. These span more than 50 skills ranging from Landscape Gardening to Mobile Robotics, and covering creative industries and construction. The competitions are designed to help people enhance their technical and employability skills at the start of their career, helping them progress in the workplace.

An outstanding national competitor from WorldSkills UK, and generally between 18 and 22 years of age, will be considered for the shortlist for a WorldSkills Competition one to four years ahead. This is how long it takes to build the skills to a world class standard, however talented you are.

If assessed and invited to join the short list, your journey involves three stages: Squad UK, Team UK, and final preparation for the WorkldSkills Competition.

At each stage competitors complete an intensive training and development programme, supported by a Training Manager to reach the standard to compete in the WorldSkills Competition.

Like any international athlete, you train hard and put yourself on the line. We constantly increase the pressure and you get stronger. If you have to step off at Squad stage, you take with you valuable new skills at full technician standard. If you get to Team UK you may be performing at specialist and even graduate levels.

What does it take to reach this standard?

Your effort and acumen, and our professional trainers.

When you enter your first WorldSkills UK National competition you may have no idea of how far you can go. The truth is that none of us know until we try. Competitions are special because they give you an opportunity to find out what you can do, and to build your skills at the same time. They let you benchmark your skills against others in your school, college and workplace. They show your employers and tutors what you can do.

The members of Team UK, competing right now, were just like you (or your learners or employees) a few years ago. Whether you are a potential competitor, an employer, teacher, trainer, parent or carer, why not find about the next cycle of WorldSkills UK national competitions, and take that first step by registering your interest?
