A message from Adam Smith, Team UK 2009

WorldSkills Gold Medallist (Cooking) and Premier Sous-Chef, The Ritz, London, age 23

I understand that in order for a set of commemorative stamps to be commissioned, we need to highlight to the Royal Mail why the UK's involvement in WorldSkills warrants such an honour. As a former member of Team UK and a Gold Medallist, I hope you find this booklet informative and that the information it contains answers that question.

WorldSkills is a unique global competition where young people from across the world compete to become the best of the best at their chosen skill. Over 45 skills are represented from Mobile Robotics, Electrical Installation and Welding through to Hairdressing, Landscape Gardening and Floristry to name a few. What's more its being hosted in London from the 5 - 8 October, 2011 after the UK successfully bid to host the event in 2006 with backing from the then Prime Minister Tony Blair.

So often, in this country young people are portrayed negatively in the media. WorldSkills offers the opportunity for us to show this country and the rest of the world how talented our young people really are.

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Being part of Team UK was an amazing opportunity both personally and professionally. It never really sank in that I was representing my country until I walked onto the stage during the opening ceremony of WorldSkills Calgary 2009. Experiencing the crowd cheering for the team gave me an enormous sense of pride and honour. It was then I realised how lucky I was to be there.

Training for Team UK certainly wasn't an easy journey. It took a huge amount of time, effort and determination. All the preparation I had to undertake to ensure I could compete on a global stage had to be done around work, which meant I had to give up my weekends and take holiday to complete training exercises. Without the support of UK Skills, the organisation responsible for selecting and training members of Team UK, I would not have been able to compete on a global stage. However my determination paid off and after four years of training, I secured the Gold Medal in Cooking. It was an amazing feeling!

During WorldSkills Calgary 2009 I spent 22 hours cooking in a packed exhibition hall alongside 34 other hopefuls from around the UK. I competed over two days working from 8:00 in the morning until 22:30 at night. There were thousands of visitors, cameras flashing and people constantly trying to talk to you. But you have to keep focussed.

Competing at WorldSkills has benefited my career tremendously and allowed me to develop the skills needed to take on more responsibility at work in my role as Sous Chef at The Ritz. As a result of the training I received I am at least five years ahead of my peers. However for WorldSkills to reach its full potential, we need to ensure that young people, their parents, colleges and employers up and down the country are aware it's coming to the UK next year. We believe a set of commemorative stamps provides the perfect opportunity to help us do this.

WorldSkills London 2011 will amaze and inspire. It will be the catalyst that sparks the ambitions of young people across the country and will be a once in a lifetime opportunity to increase respect for and shine a spotlight on vocational education and training.

We get behind our sporting heros in this country, now lets show our support for the skilled people that make this country great.

The Skills that are building the UK...

A huge 89% of the working population in the UK have a skill and the Royal Mail has the opportunity to appeal to all

We are a nation that has historically grown in power and stature because of the skills that have been developed over many centuries in our workforce. Today the UK's skills base has broadened out to include both necessary traditional skills and also many new ones designed for our modern world. All of these touch and inspire the 60+ million people who live here.

In 2009 the Office for National Statistics stated that 89% of the working population was classed as having a skill. This means that just under four million UK workers have and accept 'skills' of some sort as part of their daily working life. Now add in those UK citizens who are aware of skilled professions because those tradesmen and women are friends, family, employers and colleagues. Then include those that teach these skills and those that are in education and training to be the new skilled professionals and their parents and you will see just how important the promotion of skills and training really is. Indeed, training of the highest quality is needed in order to grow individuals, careers and develop and sustain businesses.

Vince Cable, Secretary of State for Business, Innovation and Skills and President of the Board of Trade identified his vision of Britain as "...a place where enterprise and innovation are made easier and can succeed. Where ideas are generated and turned into jobs. Where people have the skills we need."

Team UK's performance and WorldSkills London 2011 will make a real contribution to this vision. Tomorrow's workforce will be inspired and it will lead to more enterprising people who understand how skills can shape their world. Royal Mail has the opportunity to speak to all of them through a set of commemorative stamps.



Did you know that in the UK there are:

146,000 bricklayers

240,000 carpenters and joiners

350,000 people working in the electrical industry

34,000 heating and ventilation engineers

20,000 plumbing businesses

520,000 people working in the resturant industry

31,000 hair salons employing 180,000 people

120,000 people working in the furniture manufacturing industry

6,700 florists employing 28,700 people

250,000 people working in the aerospace industry with 85,000 working in engineering occupations and 40,000 in technical roles

All the skills above will be present at WorldSkills London 2011 and will showcase our country's most talented young professionals in each skill.

Why Skills Matter...

So skills touch and inspire the 60+ million people who live in the UK but why do skills deserve a higher level of recognition?

Government figures revealed that at the end of 2009 nearly 15% of 16-24 year olds were classed as NEETs (not in Employment, Education or Training) and indicators are showing that the UK will miss the target to reduce this figure in 2010. However despite this significant issue, vocational skills have simply not been given the respect they deserve. For far too long, the workbased route has been the poor relation in the post -16 educational landscape in the UK.

This must change. Vocational skills and careers are vital in building and maintaining a strong economy. Without the right skills, inward investment will dwindle and based on recent performance it has been predicted that the UK is likely to slip from 18th to 21st in OECD rankings for intermediate level by 2020 and in 10 years time the UK will not be in the top eight countries of the world in any skill level (Ambition 2020, UKCES, 2009). Attracting over 150,000 visitors over four days of competition and reaching many more people throughout the UK, WorldSkills will be the inspiration thousands of people need to explore how education and training could help them achieve their dreams and build their expertise. For employers the event will offer the chance to join leading employers in celebrating the depth and breadth of skills in this country while inspiring the workforce of the future.

The work of the WorldSkills London 2011 legacy group will bring together senior business leaders, policy makers and education professionals to ensure the event acts as a catalyst for positive change across the education and skills system.

Team UK, WorldSkills London 2011

One year before London hosts the Olympics; an equally talented group of unknown individuals, aged 18-23, from all over the country will step up and take their place in Team UK. They will be competing at WorldSkills London 2011. For Team UK there is the honour of being the greatest in the world at their chosen skill.

At the last WorldSkills, the UK won:

3 Gold Medals

Cooking, Electrical Industry and Painting and Decorating

6 Bronze Medals

Floristry, Autobody Repair, Joinery, Beauty Therapy, Restaurant Service and Aircraft Maintenance

The UK is now ranked sixth in the world based on total medal points. Team UK at WorldSkills London 2011 is tasked with beating this position and finishing in the top five.

The countdown begins... training commences

Like top athletes, Team UK members spend years training for the event. Of the 200 or so young people who make the initial shortlist, around 60 young people are invited to train as Squad UK.

Undergoing a gruelling programme involving bespoke training in their chosen skill, competitions and performance coaching, those that show they have what it takes to compete on a global stage are invited to compete for a place in Team UK.

The members of Team UK will be unveiled at a special event in June 2011. The team will consist of around 30 young people who will each compete in a different skill. These skills will be

determined when the team is picked.
