OVER THE PAST ten years l've been a competitor, helped train and support other cookery competitors, been involved with training managers on competitors' development, the wonderful UK bid in Melbourne to host the WorldSkills Competition in 2011, as well as having had the chance to speak about and share my WorldSkills experience with others at both the Houses of Parliament and 10 Downing Street.

I was also impressed yet again by the passion and determination of the UK Skills team behind the scenes to make it a fair competition and get the very best out of the competitors, training managers as well as the work that goes on behind the scenes with the WorldSkills International team and its representatives.

It was also a great honour to sit on a panel during a question and answer session at the Worldskills International Leaders' Forum alongside five other past competitors from around the globe to speak about how WorldSkills had played a part in our careers as well as discuss the role that WorldSkills can play in education and the different approaches to learning in each country.

The culmination of the trip for me was the closing ceremony. Team UK was absolutely outstanding; all those medals! I am so proud of all of them - they are a real credit to the UK and they are exceptional ambassadors for skills. City & Guilds honours Team UK at its annual Senior Awards

UK SKILLS HAS announced that it has awarded the City & Guilds' prestigious Licentiateship Senior Award (LCGI) to those aspiring international competitors who have successfully completed the two-to-four year training programme. In a ceremony on 8th May 2010 that will be attended by members of the Council of City and Guilds at The Merchant Taylors Hall in the City of London, 32 young men and women steeped in the WorldSkills development process will receive the LCGI Award. Of these, 26 represented the UK last September at WorldSkills Calgary 2009.

All 32 have undertaken a rigorous training and development programme in their specialist skill and other essential aspects of world class performance including the ability to perform under acute pressure, to monitor and assess their improvement, to respond to and negotiate with others, and to add significant value to their workplaces.

To qualify for the LGCI candidates must fulfil two key requirements: to understand and practise a technical or professional activity and to demonstrate achievement in a range of pre-defined personal skills and specific competences.

UK Skills was awarded Delegated Authority status by City & Guilds in 2002, allowing it to make senior awards on behalf of the Awarding Body.

Simon Bartley, Chief Executive of UK Skills said: "The high number of awards this year given to young people is testament to the robust training framework we have put in place at UK Skills. Traditionally the Licentiateship Senior Award is given to those who have worked in the industry longer but we have been able to take our aspiring competitors from skilled crafts people to full professional standing in a relatively short period of time. This achievement would not have been possible without our dedicated training managers and continued investment from the government."

Ursula Russell, Chair of the Senior Awards Panel, added: "What I've seen shows that the standard of the competitors has improved hugely. They are so much better prepared than ever before and working to a much higher standard. There is clear evidence of much stronger training and development for WorldSkills Calgary, as enabled by a significant increase in resources."

As past WorldSkills competitors you may have the opportunity to share your direct experience with future competitors. With more training and experience you may also be invited to observe and ultimately be involved in training and assessment.

You may also be invited to train as a mentor for future competitors. This will not only have a positive impact on them but you will also be learning a valuable life skill.

Alumni Awards launched 'Have your say' on

UK SKILLS IS proud to announce the launch of two annual awards for WorldSkills, UK Alumni members that are sponsored by Edge, the independent education foundation. The award categories are:

Most Valuable Contribution to Skills and Practical Learning Outstanding Achievement

The Awards were officially launched at the 2009 WorldSkills UK Competitions Awards, which took place on the 12th November at the IMAX in London.

The application process itself will consist of a one page entry form. Applicants can apply themselves or be nominated by friends, work colleagues, UK Skills or Edge. Aside from providing personal details, applicants or nominators will be asked to provide a supporting statement no longer than 250 words explaining why the award is deserved. The following criteria will be applied:

The Award for Most Valuable Contribution to Skills and Practical Learning The application must demonstrate that the person has made a significant impact by supporting skills and practical learning. This could include ideas for the improvement of the WorldSkills, UK Alumni, encouraging other young people to become involved in competitions or playing an active role in promoting practical learning and vocational skills

The application must demonstrate that the person has given up his or her own time to support skills or practical learning. Examples of this could be providing support for the development of competitions through mentoring or competition design, speaking at events or supporting the development of WorldSkills London 2011.

The Award for Outstanding Achievement

The application must demonstrate that the person has significantly 'excelled' since their participation in the WorldSkills Competition. This could include getting a big promotion at work or setting up a successful new business.

The applicant must be able to explain what skills they

have gained though the achievement.

A reference must be supplied for verification. Entries will be short listed using the criteria above and then judged by a panel comprising of representatives from Edge and UK Skills.

Short listed entries will be notified by post or e-mail and all applicants will be invited to attend the presentation of the awards at the annual WorldSkills UK Awards ceremony. Both awards will be presented by the Chief Executive of UK Skills and a nominated representative from Edge.
