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
The 35 young men and women who have qualified as members of the UK Team at the 1989 International Skill Olympics have all gone through a rigorous process of training and selection.

The National Council for Vocational Qualifications is proud to be sponsoring the UK Team and know that they will all give of their very best over the four days of competition.




A TEAM EFFORT IN VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING




ARE YOU QUALIFIED TO SUCCEED?

We can only be effective if we are competent in the jobs that we do.

Competence can only be achieved by being properly trained to do the work that is needed to the standards that our employers and their customers expect.

It is the prime task of the National Council for Vocational Qualifications to ensure that all qualifications related to the work that people do are based on a proper assessment of their competence. In every major industry we have already begun to introduce these new National Vocational qualifications – NVQs for short.



WHAT ARE NVQs - NATIONAL VOCATIONAL QUALIFICATIONS?


All NVQs are based on an industries' own standards; all require a comprehensive assessment to be made of the skills, the knowledge and understanding and the ability to demonstrate competence in practice; and all NVQs command recognition throughout the industries to which they apply.

By 1991, NVQs will have been introduced into every industry and will relate to all levels of employment within each industry.

Access to NVQs will not be restricted by age or where or for how long a person has been trained, but on whether the individual can meet through a professionally managed process of assessment, the standards of competence determined by the industry in which they work or wish to be employed.

The National Council is sponsoring the UK Team at the '89 Olympics because it is our job to help Britain develop a more competent society. The promotion of excellence in vocational education and training lies at the very heart of our business.

Whether you aim to compete in the next Skill Olympics in the Netherlands, or are just interested in getting or holding down a good job in a company competing for Britain – **Will you be qualified to succeed?**
