Finally, I would like to say goodby to all of you, and not having words to express my deep gratitude and admiration towards this great nation of Japan, towards the people of Japan; I in this country of roses, in this country of flowers, in this country of such a great artistic sensitiveness in poetry, music and culture, would like to tell you in ending a small poetry of my own country. It says: Woman, give him an alm because there is nothing so sad in the world as to be blind in Japan.
