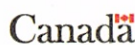

WorldSkills Calgary 2009 will be an extraordinary field trip for about 50,000 students attending from across Alberta. Global Skills Marketplace

The Global Skills Marketplace (GSM) is a half-day series of world-class workshops addressing important global skills issues. More than 150 individuals and representatives from regional and international organizations will participate in this event on September 2, 2009.

The GSM workshops are interactive, and participants engage with both presenters and their colleagues. Topics this year include Skills in a Post-Recession World-Class Economy, Skills Standards for Technology Based Industry, Multiple Assessment Pathways Project, The Mobile Workforce: From India to Canada and a Samsung-Credu Blended E-learning Project. 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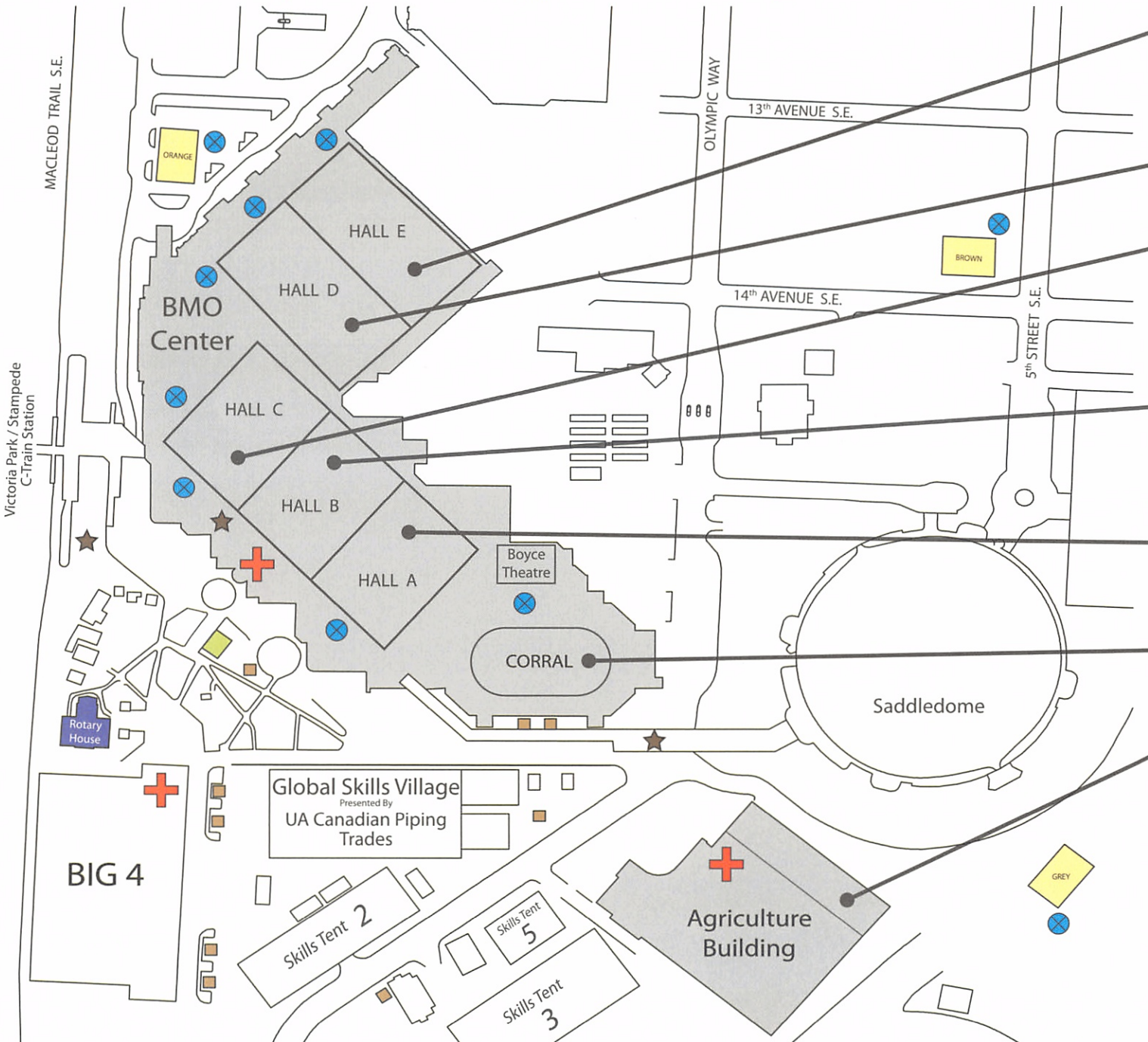
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WSC2009 Venue Map - Stampede Park

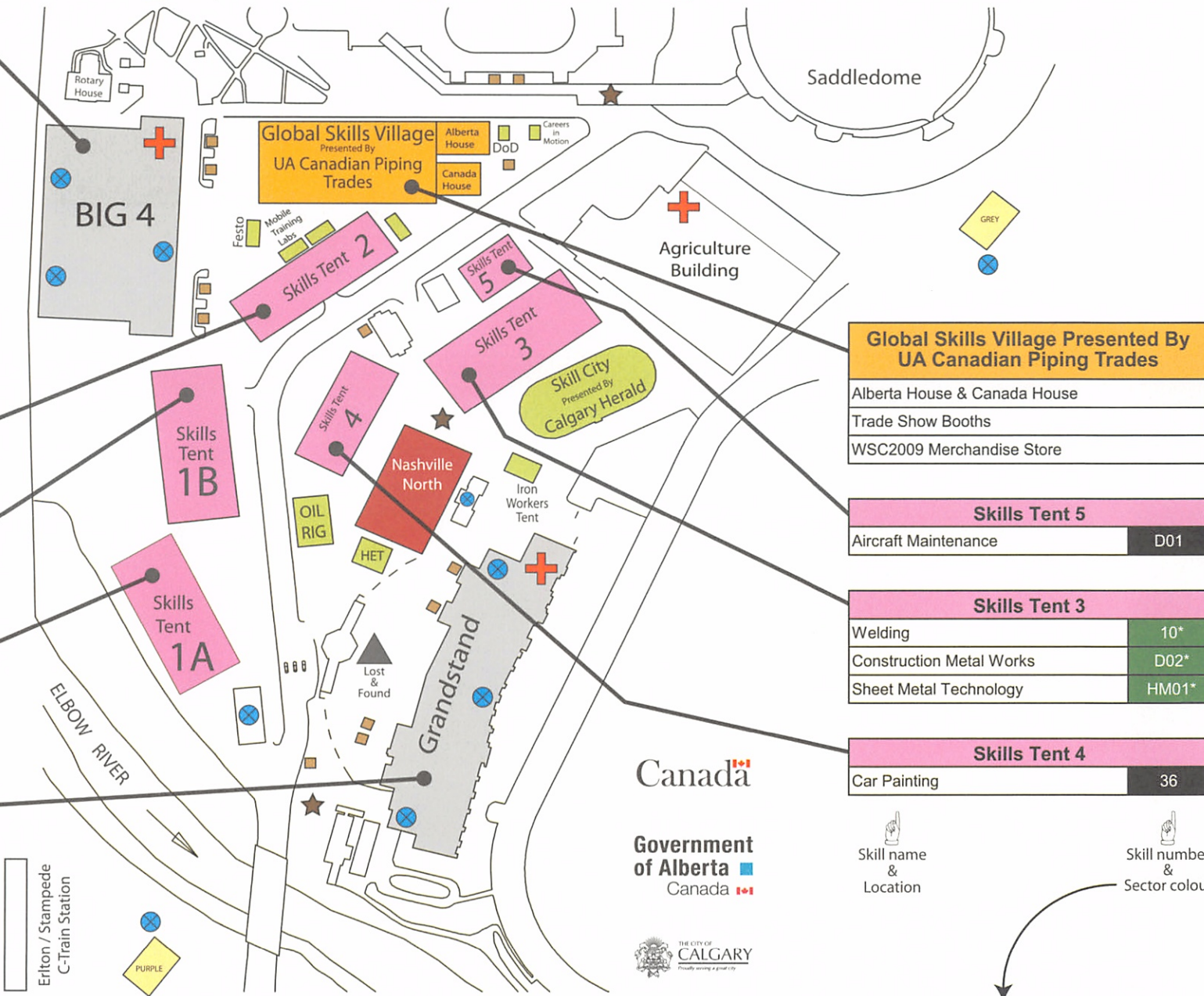

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WorldSkills Calgary 2009 Competition Categories

Transportation and Logistics

13 – Autobody Repair: Autobody repairers restore body work damage, ranging from mechanical to cosmetic, mainly caused by road accidents.

33 – Automotive Technology: Automotive technicians are able to understand the important functions of car systems and carry out troubleshooting, maintenance and repair work.

36 – Car Painting: Car painters remove, mark out and replace vehicle body parts, prepare vehicle surfaces, treat the vehicle with protective chemicals, apply prime coats and remove rust.

D1 – Aircraft Maintenance: An aircraft maintenance technician inspects, services, troubleshoots, removes, installs and repairs aircraft systems.

Construction and Building Technology

12 – Wall and Floor Tiling: Consists of using tiling tools and equipment to install and fix floor and wall tiles, decorative tiling and tiling of pools and spas.

14 – Metal Roofing: Roofers build and install roofs, walls, furring, guttering and roof safety structures at construction sites.

15 – Plumbing and Heating: Plumbers install water, drainage and heating pipes for houses and industrial sites. Their tasks can include gas and compressed air pipe installations.

18 – Electrical Installations: Electrical installers manufacture, maintain and repair electrical equipment for houses, industrial sites and power stations.

19 – Industrial Control: Industrial controllers install conduits, cables, devices, instruments, automated devices and control centre fittings quickly and safely.

20 – Bricklaying: Bricklayers work on commercial and residential projects where they cut and lay brick, stone, glass block or terra cotta to build walls, fireplaces, chimneys and other structures.

21 – Stonemasonry: The art of crafting stone. Buildings, structures and sculptures are all constructed by stonemasons.

22 – Painting and Decorating: Involves preparing surfaces, selecting paints and colours, brushing, rolling or spraying paints and applying decorative finishes.

24 – Cabinetmaking: A cabinetmaker works with wood to produce furniture, cabinetry and architectural millwork from a variety of natural and manufactured materials.

26 – Carpentry: Carpenters have expertise in a wide variety of skills that are needed in commercial construction as well as in residential building and structural maintenance.

25 – Joinery: The process of connecting or joining two pieces of wood together through the use of various forms of wood joints.

37 – Landscape Gardening: Landscape gardeners design, develop and apply landscape plans, haul and spread topsoil, care for plants, mow, water, fertilize and trim.

38 – Refrigeration: Refrigeration technicians install components which form the refrigeration system. When your air conditioning stops working, these are the professionals you call.

D03 – Plastering and Drywall Systems: consists of the development and the decoration of buildings by the processing of elements and materials essentially containing plaster.

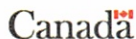

Information and Communication Technology

2 – Information Network Cabling: Information Network Cabling consists of the designing, installing and testing of telecommunication networks.

9 – IT/Software Applications: Involves various uses of Microsoft Office software (or similar) and graphic programs.

11 – Offset Printing: Offset printers are able to fit printing plates or cylinders on presses, mix the inks that go on them and adjust the colour flow to the image.

17 – Web Design: Web designers use computer programs to produce web pages that include links to other pages, graphic elements, text and photographs.

39 – IT/PC Network Support: Consists of assembling personal computers (PCs) with accessories and network devices for home and business environments.

Manufacturing and Engineering Technology

1 – Polymechanics/Automation: Covers a broad range of activities within manufacturing, assembly, maintenance and technical control systems.

3 – Manufacturing Team Challenge: Involves designing and manufacturing equipment assemblies using a variety of skills, including draft and computerized design.

4 – Mechatronics: Technicians build, maintain, repair and program equipment control systems for the automation industry.

5 – Mechanical Engineering Design – CAD: Covers the use of computer-aided design (CAD) technology to produce documentation in manufacturing, including product drawings, paperwork and 3D models.

6 – CNC Turning: A process used to produce cylindrical components through metal cutting using computer numerically controlled (CNC) lathes.

7 – CNC Milling: Involves cutting metal materials with computer numerically controlled (CNC) milling machines.

8 – Mould Making: Produces plastic parts ranging from mobile phone covers and TV remotes, to bottles and toys.

10 – Welding: Involves the fusing and separation of materials using a variety of processes.

16 – Electronics: Involves manufacturing, testing and troubleshooting electronic equipment.

23 – Mobile Robotics: A team competition that requires competitors to assemble, set-up, manage and maintain mechanical systems within a mobile robot.

HM01 – Sheet Metal Technology: Sheet metal technologists fabricate and install a wide variety of construction-related items using sheet metal or plastic material components.

D02 – Construction Metal Works: Covers the construction of steel structures, their assembly and formation, maintenance and repair and general steel fabrications.

Creative Arts and Fashion

27 – Jewellery: Jewellers create beautiful and durable jewellery out of precious metals for a variety of customers.

28 – Floristry: The art of creating bouquets and compositions from flowers, foliage, ornamental grasses and other botanical materials.

31 – Fashion Technology: Fashion designers develop and create new clothing and accessory designs, as well as analyze fashion trends, choose the colours and fabrics and work closely with production, marketing and sales departments.

40 – Graphic Design Technology: Graphic designers research and manage virtual design projects, with a primary focus on electronic media.

Social and Personal Services

29 – Ladies'/Men's Hairdressing: Hairdressers must demonstrate the correct cutting techniques, curling, colouring and barbering with creativity, imagination and technical ability.

30 – Beauty Therapy: A beauty therapist is a specialist in skin care, skin care advice, massage and makeup.

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- 32 – Confectioner/Pastry Cook:** Confectioners and pastry cooks create delicious products for all kinds of events, needing artistic flair and talent.
- 34 – Cooking:** A cook is trained to manage commercial kitchens, plan menus and prepare appealing and nutritious meals according to health and safety regulations.

From May 25 until May 29, a team assembled by WorldSkills Calgary 2009 Ltd. will 'hot stage' the Network Operating Centre (NOC) in Winnipeg, MN, using a portion of the equipment.

WorldSkills Calgary 2009 IT Manager, Roger Dery, leads the hot stage team, along with members of some of the IT Project's partnering companies including Cisco, Allstream, HP, and Epic Information Solutions. WorldSkills International will also be present to test and verify the IT system's capability of handling the complicated needs of the WorldSkills Competition. Other partners contributing to the IT Project for the overall event are Fluke Networks, Draka, VM Ware, Microsoft, and Autodesk. Dery says 'hot staging' includes set-up, configuration and testing of the entire NOC. The system includes multiple layers of security and reliability methods. Dery says it is comparable in size to TransCanada Pipeline building networks in downtown Calgary, AB, Canada.

The main goal of the IT Project is to ensure a reliable and secure network for the 40th WorldSkills Competition. Testing the NOC with a reliable representation of the equipment involved will provide organizers with insight on any enhancements needed for the September 1 – 7 event. The international event, held in Calgary, AB, Canada, will involve over 900 Competitors from 51 countries/regions competing in 45 different skills. Each skill will be tested from a Competitor and judging perspective during the hot staging. Other systems include streaming audio and video and secure wireless Internet that will be available for Competitors and guests throughout the grounds.

During the 40th WorldSkills Competition in September, the NOC is set to manage an extensive network of equipment, including:

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Technical Backgrounder

WorldSkills Calgary 2009 Information Technology (IT) Project includes the implementation of a secure, resilient Cisco network supporting high performance wired and wireless infrastructure for the 40th WorldSkills Competition. Selected partners are Cisco, Fluke Networks, and EPIC Information Solutions. They are teaming up with MTS Allstream, HP, VM Ware, Microsoft, Draka and Autodesk. The entire system will be monitored and tested by WorldSkills International to ensure that all the highest level of efficiency is being reaching during the event. The WorldSkills Calgary 2009 mandate is to provide an Information Technology Solution that offers security, reliability and accessibility with the least amount of management throughout the Competition.

The Network Operating Centre (NOC) includes multiple layers of security and reliability methods for the Competition Information System (CIS), which is needed for judging of the 45 skilled categories. It is the first time a system of this capacity will be used. It will set the precedent for future WorldSkills Competitions, and could also be implemented as the future design for educational institutes. NOC includes various security appliances from Cisco and Fluke Networks. The Security Monitoring, Analysis and Response System (MARS) monitors the Data Link and Network layer of the backbone. The NOC backbone is designed on a Windows Server 2008 Platform with VMware/SAN based set-up and backups offloading to an HP Deduplication unit. There are three physical servers each installed with virtual servers. This structuring provides several back-ups if one or more servers fail. Servers can easily be moved while still running, thereby allowing maintenance without causing any downtime. NOC will use several disaster recovery techniques and 8 terabytes of memory to ensure the security and reliability of the system throughout the Competition.

WorldSkills Calgary 2009 Competitors and visitors will experience streaming audio and video throughout Stampede Park and secure wireless Internet within the WorldSkills Competition network, media center and VIP lounge. Equipment used in the IT Project includes:

Payette also has links to robotics. She worked as a technical advisor for the Mobile Servicing System (MSS), an advanced robotics system contributed by Canada to the International Space Station. During the Endeavour mission, Payette will maneuver three robotic arms during five planned spacewalks. Other skill categories that draw on skills, trades, and technologies used in space travel include Mechanical Engineering, Polymechanics, Mechatronics, and Electronics.

She not only represents the technology sector that will be portrayed in the upcoming Competition, but she is an exceptional role-model for Canadian youth."
