Having started at Hartlepool ITeC as YTS trainees, both Ians joined the large Stockton-based company, Davy McKee. Both are continuing their computer studies at Teesside Polytechnic. Following their success in Birmingham, the Mayor of Hartlepool, Mrs Margaret Kellman, visited Hartlepool ITeC personally to congratulate them. The Chairman of Hartlepool's Economic Development Subcommittee, Councillor Bob Barnfather said, 'I was absolutely elated when I heard the news.
