Sir,

I am commanded to inform you that an Investiture will be held at Buckingham Palace on Tuesday, 3rd March, 1964, at which your attendance is requested.

I am desired to say that you should arrive at the Palace between the hours of 10 o'clock and 10.30 o'clock a.m., and this letter should be shown on entering the gates of the Palace, as no other card of admission is issued to recipients. Cars may be parked in the inner quadrangle of the Palace under police direction. No windscreen tickets are issued.

If desired, two guests are permitted to accompany you to watch the Ceremony, and tickets for them may be obtained by making application on the form enclosed herewith which should be returned to me as soon as possible.

The only exception to this rule is that, if a recipient wishes to bring with him his wife and two sons, or two daughters, or a son and daughter, a third ticket will be issued, but in NO circumstances will a fourth ticket be issued.

DRESS.

(a) Serving Officers and other ranks of the Royal Navy, Army and Royal Air Force should wear the dress laid down in the regulations of their respective Service. Decorations and Medals should not be worn; nor should swords be worn.

(b) Retired Officers who are not in possession of the dress described in (a) should wear Morning Dress or Dark Lounge Suit. Orders, Decorations and Medals should not be worn.

(c) Civilians may, *if they so desire*, wear the uniform of the Civil Organization or Service to which they belong; otherwise they should wear Morning Dress or Dark Lounge Suit. Orders, Decorations and Medals should not be worn.
