Competition Days, Sept. 2 - 5, Stampede Park

Watch 900 highly-skilled, passionate Competitors participate in 45 skills on the international stage. Interim results will be available daily, as the top five Competitors in most categories will be announced after each Competition day. In order to interview a Competitor, media must coordinate through the Team Leader for each country/region. Their contact information will be available in the media centre.

This program matches elementary and junior high schools in Calgary with teams from each of the 51 WorldSkills International Member countries/regions. On Sept. 1, 55 schools will welcome those teams to Calgary (some teams will be split into two) with pep rallies, traditional western meals, line dancing and more.

50,000 Alberta Students Visit WorldSkills Calgary 2009

The Government of Alberta has provided funding for all Grade 9 and 10 students in Alberta to visit WorldSkills Calgary 2009. These students will gain tremendous perspective on skills, trades and technologies. Some schools have decided to send more than just Grade 9 and 10, seeing the value for all students to attend the 40th WorldSkills Competition. The student visits will occur throughout the week. 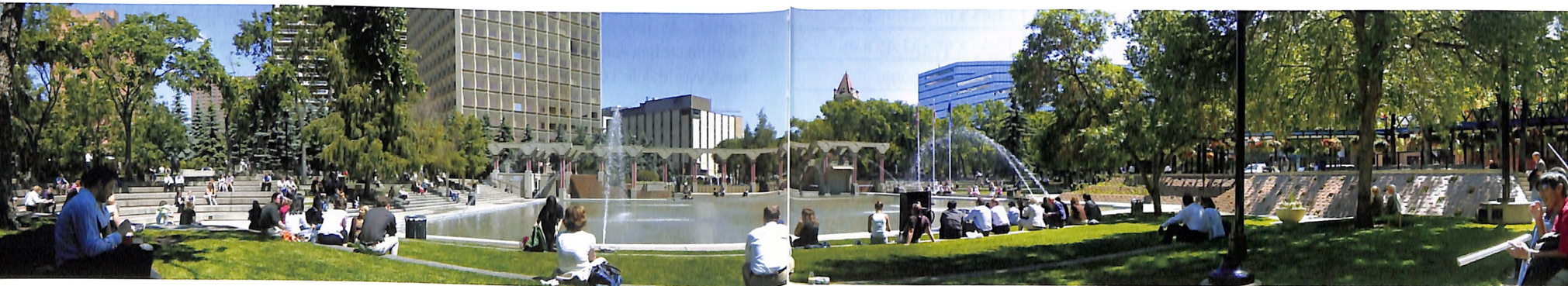

WorldSkills Leaders' Forum

WorldSkills International is proud to host leaders from government, industry, education and unions from around the world will gather in Calgary, Canada on September 3, 2009 to participate in the WorldSkills Leaders Forum (WSLF). The WSLF is the preeminent annual forum on global skills issues. This year's WSLF is the largest to date with all of the 600 seats have filled.

Canadian business executive, consultant and author Don Tapscott will deliver the keynote address. Tapscott is one of the world's leading authorities on business strategy and the strategic value and impact of information technology. He has authored such books as *Wikinomics: How Mass Collaboration Changes Everything*, and *Growing Up Digital*. Following his keynote address, Tapscott will moderate a panel discussion of five Past Champions from recent WorldSkills Competitions. Global Skills Marketplace

The Global Skills Marketplace (GSM) is a half-day series of world-class workshops addressing important global skills issues. More than 150 individuals and representatives from regional and international organizations will participate in this event on September 2, 2009.

The GSM workshops are interactive, and participants engage with both presenters and their colleagues. Topics this year include Skills in a Post-Recession World-Class Economy, Skills Standards for Technology Based Industry, Multiple Assessment Pathways Project, The Mobile Workforce: From India to Canada and a Samsung-Credu Blended E-learning Project. Organizations presenting the workshops include the City & Guilds Centre for Skills Development, the Canadian Printing Industry Sector Council, the Industry Training Authority of British Columbia, Canada, and Samsung with Credu.

Workshops are conducted twice so participants may learn about and address two of these important global skills issues.

After the workshops, all GSM participants will gather for lunch to discuss these topics further. The GSM is proudly supported by WorldSkills International's Global Industry Partners.

Equipment Legacy Program

The Government of Alberta is the leading funder of the 40th WorldSkills Competition. Part of this support includes a \$14 million grant to WorldSkills Calgary 2009 to purchase equipment for competitors and staff to use during the competition as part of the Alberta government's WorldSkills Equipment Legacy Program.

Once the Competition is over, the state-of-the-art equipment will be distributed to successful high schools and post-secondary institutions across Alberta. The nearly-new teaching resources will upgrade skills, trades and technology classrooms and labs, and enhance learning opportunities overall for Alberta learners.

Equipment and tools will be allocated to publicly funded high schools offering career and technology studies courses and post-secondary institutions offering apprenticeship technical training. Investing \$24 million to support the competition and \$4 million to transport thousands of Alberta students to the events is part of Alberta's efforts to encourage youth to pursue careers in the skills, trades and technologies and build Alberta's next generation workforce.

History of the WorldSkills Competition

WorldSkills International began in 1950 in Madrid, Spain, due to the great need to encourage youth to pursue careers in the trades. Since then, biennial Competitions have been held all over the world, from Europe to Australia, Japan to the United States.

WorldSkills Calgary 2009 marks the second time Canada has hosted the WorldSkills Competition; the first being Montreal in 1999. This is the third time the event has come to North America as Atlanta, Georgia, hosted WorldSkills in 1981. The 38th and 39th Competitions were held in Helsinki, Finland, and Shizuoka, Japan, respectively.

More than 41,000 primary, junior and senior high school students experienced first-hand the 39th WorldSkills Competition in Shizuoka, Japan, in 2007. The WorldSkills Competition improved the image of vocational training, skills and trades through committed Competitors and Experts.

Host cities are continually raising the bar, and the Competition is becoming bigger and better at each event. We are building on the success of the Shizuoka event to make the Calgary Competition the new benchmark for future Competitions.

The next WorldSkills Competition will happen in London, UK, in 2011 (www.worldskills2011.com). In Calgary on September 1, it will be decided whether Leipzig, Germany, or Paris, France, will host the WorldSkills Competition in 2013.

WorldSkills Calgary 2009 Firsts

WorldSkills Calgary 2009 will be the first international WorldSkills Competition to accomplish many feats, including:

1. First dedicated English language Education Program with identified Teacher Champions in every school in the city.
2. First WorldSkills Competition Skills Road Show, an interactive truck and trailer visiting communities throughout Alberta.
3. First comprehensive hands-on interactive Try-A-Skill program across the majority of skill categories.
4. First Skills Ambassador Stations initiative, including Skill Ambassadors to engage spectators.
5. First welcome/orientation structures (Launch Pads) to explain the site layout to all visitors.
6. First Single Site Competitors' Village, where all Competitors share the same high quality accommodation.
10. First Competition to focus on a sustainable/environmental design and to conduct an environmental audit.
11. First integrated six-day Competition schedule.
12. First coordinated presentation of Daily Reports.
13. First WorldSkills online store with merchandise available prior to the event, co-branded merchandise available for sponsors, online secure payment and shipping available world-wide.
14. First WorldSkills Competition to have a dedicated YouTube Channel.
15. First WorldSkills Competition to have a dedicated Facebook and Twitter presence.
16. First WorldSkills property on Second Life that will be a replica of Stampede Park and will serve an international market.
17. First integrated sponsorship program with shared cultivation, research and information between WorldSkills Calgary 2009, WorldSkills International and WorldSkills London 2011.
18. First time that one hundred professionally produced digital vignettes are captured and edited with international same-day distribution on WorldSkills TV.
19. First WorldSkills Competition to have a Farewell Event to present all Competitors to the public and the media.
20. The CUTEST Mascots in the history of WorldSkills.

Media Centre

Three types of media accreditation are issued by WorldSkills Calgary 2009 as determined by WorldSkills International – professional media, WorldSkills International Member Media and official media.

WorldSkills Calgary 2009 Competition Categories

Transportation and Logistics

- 13 – Autobody Repair:** Autobody repairers restore bodywork damage.
- 33 – Automotive Technology:** Automotive technicians are able to understand the important functions of car systems and carry out maintenance and repair work.
- 36 – Car Painting:** Car painters remove, mark out and replace vehicle body parts, prepare vehicle surfaces and treat vehicles with protective chemicals.
- D1 – Aircraft Maintenance:** An aircraft maintenance technician inspects, services, troubleshoots, removes, installs and repairs aircraft systems.

Construction and Building Technology

- 12 – Wall and Floor Tiling:** Consists of using tiling tools and equipment to install and fix floor and wall tiles, decorative tiling and tiling of pools and spas.
- 14 – Metal Roofing:** Roofers build and install roofs, walls, furring, guttering and roof safety structures at construction sites.
- 15 – Plumbing and Heating:** Plumbers install water, drainage and heating pipes.
- 18 – Electrical Installations:** Electrical installers manufacture, maintain and repair electrical equipment for houses, industrial sites and power stations.
- 19 – Industrial Control:** Industrial controllers install conduits, cables, devices, instruments, automated devices and control centre fittings quickly and safely.
- 20 – Bricklaying:** Bricklayers work on commercial and residential projects where they cut and lay brick, stone or terra cotta to build walls, fireplaces and other structures.
- 21 – Stonemasonry:** The art of crafting stone, including buildings and sculptures.
- 22 – Painting and Decorating:** Involves preparing surfaces, selecting paints and colours, brushing, rolling or spraying paints and applying decorative finishes.

16 – Electronics: Involves manufacturing and testing electronic equipment.

23 – Mobile Robotics: A team competition that requires Competitors to assemble, set-up, manage and maintain mechanical systems within a mobile robot.

HM01 – Sheet Metal Technology: Sheet metal technologists fabricate and install a wide variety of construction-related items using sheet metal or plastic materials.

D02 – Construction Metal Works: Covers the construction of steel structures, their assembly and formation, maintenance and repair and general steel fabrications.

27 – Jewellery: Jewellers create jewellery out of previous metals.

28 – Floristry: The art of creating bouquets and compositions from flowers, foliages, herbs, ornamental grasses and other botanical materials.

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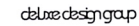

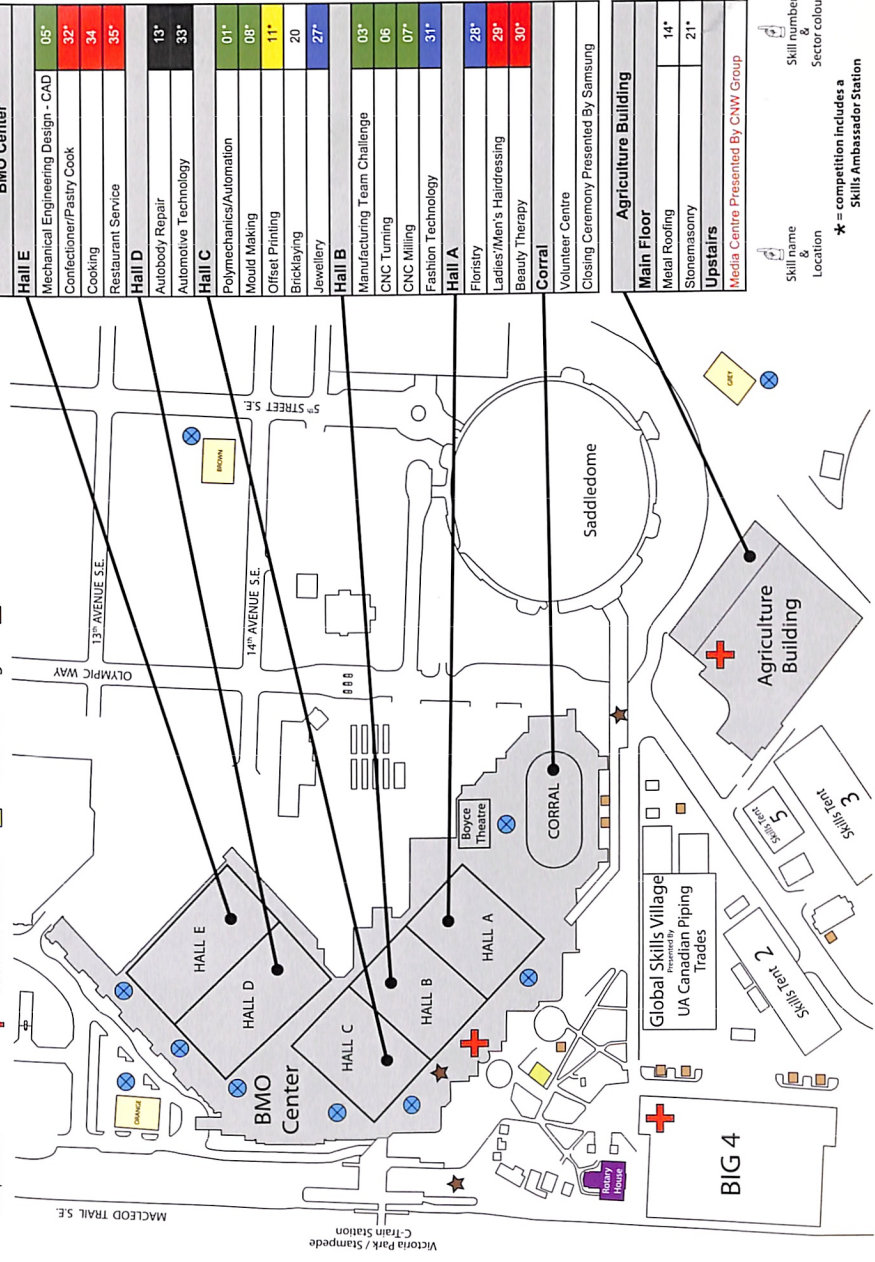

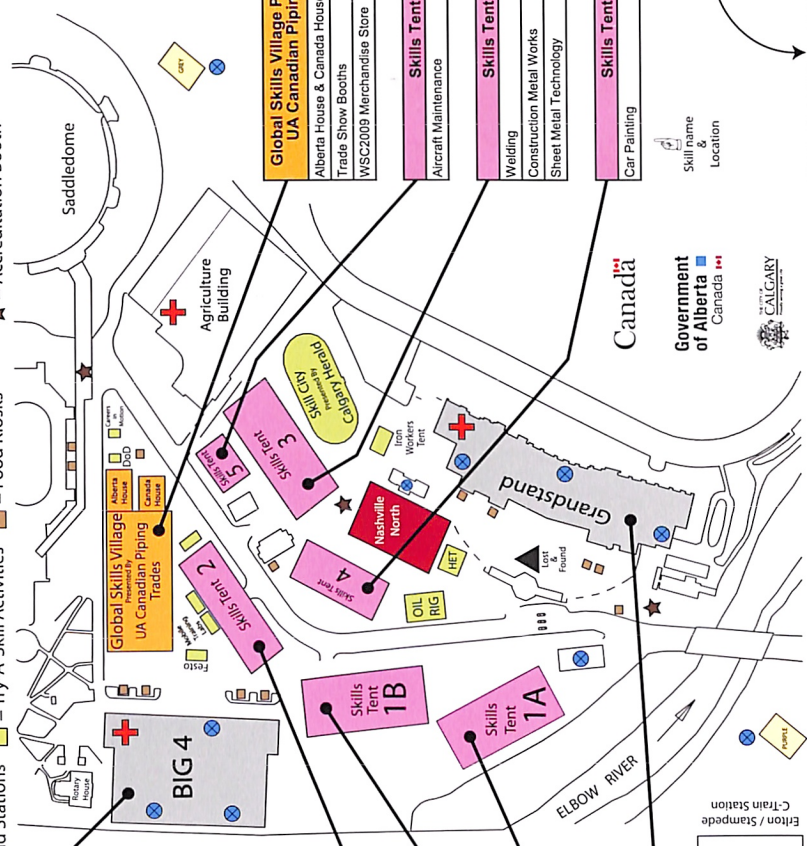
