Paul also helps UK Skills with the training and assessment of the Landscape Gardening competitors for Team UK.

have been honoured with this award is truly amazing. We all worked really hard to create the garden and are all really proud of what we have managed to achieve. We hope that visitors will take the time to really look around the garden and start to learn just how much hard work actually goes into landscape gardening. There are lots of different skills involved and our garden shows off the best in bricklaying and stonemasonry as well as plumbing, cabinet making and electrical installation.

I FIRST GOT involved in skills competitions at a regional National Beauty Therapy competition held in Warwickshire. Winning that competition earned me a place in Team UK which saw me travel to Canada to represent the UK at WorldSkills Montreal 1999. I can still remember the competition vividly; walking out onto the stage and representing the UK at the opening ceremony was the highlight for me and still gives me a lump in my throat to this day.

My appointment gave me the opportunity to travel to WorldSkills Calgary 2009 with Jade Kidd, the WorldSkills Shizuoka 2007 Beauty Therapy competitor, who I will be working with in London. We were given the opportunity to watch the competition from an organiser's point of view to get some idea of the task we would be taking on for WorldSkills London 2011. Whilst at the competition I managed to see Team UK at work and I can honestly say that the standards demonstrated were the highest I have ever seen.

By staying involved with the work of UK Skills I am able to work and train with the best and most talented skilled young people in the UK. I also get the chance to change things for the better by using my experience to train competitors both mentally and practically so that they perform to the best of their abilities. UK Skills gave me so much when I was a competitor

and so I always felt I wanted to give something back.

Competing at WorldSkills played a huge part in my career development. I always wanted to pursue a career in teaching and my competition experience gave me the confidence to realise that dream.

I have already begun working on bringing Beauty Therapy students from colleges and schools to be models on our competition stand to give them an inspiring and memorable experience. I'm really hoping that I will be able to help make the Beauty Therapy Competition at WorldSkills London 2011 the best one yet and I hope to see as many fellow Alumni members as possible cheering for Team UK.

REGISTRATIONS TO WorldSkills UK regional and national competitions have a tradition of increasing significantly year on year, and the 2009/10 registration period has been no exception to this. We have received nearly 30% more registrations this year, bringing the total number of potential competitors to over 5000.

The most popular competition this year has been the Automobile Technology competition, run aspart of a suite of automotive competitions by the Institute of the Motor Industry called SkillAuto. This has been followed by the Hairdressing and Uniformed Services competitions, which have each received more than

100 additional registrations compared with their totals last year. A sizeable rise in interest has also been seen in Web Design, Beauty Therapy, Popular Music, Caring and Floristry, Car Painting and Autobody Repair.

However, despite this increase in the numbers of people wanting to participate in these competitions there has been little, if any, increase in the number of registrations to many of the competitions in the Engineering sector. Similarly, the registrations to many of the IT competitions has remained fairly consistent to last year. Nevertheless, we have already seen that the drop out between registration and participation has decreased significantly since last year with more people attending competitions to compete than ever before.

With an exciting set of potential new partners waiting in the wings eager to take up the challenge of organising a WorldSkills UK skills competition, as well as an excellent selection of organisers, hosts and partners who continue to offer us their support year after year, we are poised to build upon the successes of the past year with our 2010/11 competiton cycle, due to be launched on 4 October 2010.

Alistair Birt (Team UK 2009) & Will Torrent (Team UK 2007) both competed at the annual Hotelympia event 28 February to 4 March 2010. Alistair Birt won a Gold Medal in the 'Decorative Exhibit' Class and Will Torrent won a Silver Medal in the 'Tea Pastries' Senior Class.

THE THREE hospitality competitors from Team UK 2009 were recognised for their achievements at WorldSkills Calgary at an annual Prize Winners' Lunch hosted by the Worshipful Company of Cooks of London on Wednesday 3 March.

Graham Craddock, Worshipful Company of Cooks' Master, presented each of the Alumni with a special

PHIL VANDRIES (Team UK 2003) first became interested in technical drawing in his design and technology classes at school. He really enjoyed the subject and excelled in class but at the age of 14 didn't yet understand how his skills could be used in the working world. So it wasn't until Phil completed a work experience placement where he used Computer Aided Design that he really became hooked on his skill.

Phil said: "To me Computer Aided Design was just like playing with a scaled up version of Meccano on screen. I loved being creative with that and design engineering seemed like the natural follow on."

Phil was introduced to skills competitions by his employer, Granada Material Handling, who were very interested in supporting and championing vocational qualifications. Phil submitted some of his work to the competition organisers but had no idea how the competition would impact his future success. With the continued support of his employer, despite being



incredibly busy at work, Phil went on to win both the regional and national CAD competitions. With a national competition win under his belt Phil then began his journey to the international WorldSkills Competition with a new realisation of the opportunities that could lie ahead for him.

Following an intense period of training and preparation,

Phil flew out to WorldSkills St. Gallen 2003 as part of Team UK.

He said "WorldSkills was a defining moment in my life. The opportunity to represent my own country in my own trade was fantastic. The entire journey from selection to team building and training, right through to the competition itself is one that has shaped me into the person I am today." The six months intensive training significantly helped Phil's development and the fact he can say that he represented the UK and achieved 12th place in the world, is a serious selling point on his CV.

Phil continues to work at Granada, the same company where he first got a taste for CAD and started his WorldSkills journey. As a very important member of the design team, Phil now manages special projects that deviate from standard products. Granada continues to support Phil in his development and he really enjoys the variety of his job. He plans to stay on at Granada and says he would like to move up the ranks and in the future would maybe even like take over the running of the company. Watch this space! Granada Material Handling
