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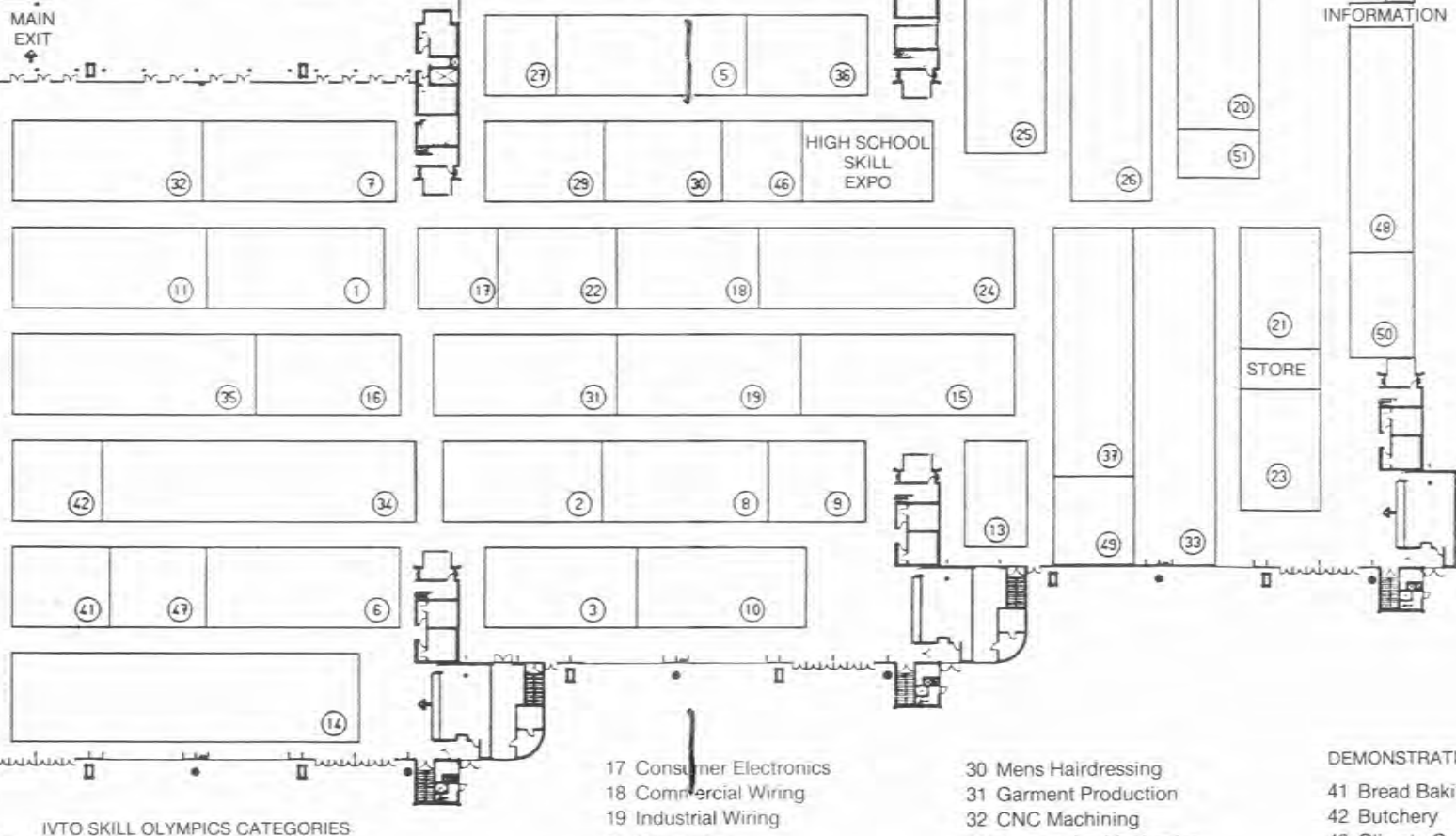

FREE PUBLIC TRANSPORT:

All Official and Technical Delegates, Official Observers, Experts, Competitors, Team Leaders and their accompanying people will receive a pass which entitles them to free bus/rail/ferry transport in the Sydney Metropolitan area — north to Palm Beach, south to Cronulla and west to Parramatta. Helpers at hotel hospitality desks will advise on public transport.

BUSES TO COMPETITION SITE:

Buses will depart from Koala Greetings, Olims and Gazebo Hotels on February 18-21 for Official Delegates, Official Observers, Observers and accompanying people. Guests staying at Sheraton and Chateau Commodore Hotels are to join the Olims Hotel bus. Departure times will be advised by hospitality people. Bookings are not essential.

TRANSPORT — COMPETITORS/TEAM LEADERS:

Hospitality Officers in university colleges will give advice about public transport from the University.

BANKS:

Banks are open Monday to Wednesday from 10.00 a.m. - 3.00 p.m. and are open between 10.00 a.m. and 4.30 p.m. on Thursday and Friday. There are several banks in Macleay Street and Darlinghurst Road, Kings Cross for those staying at Gazebo, Olims, Sheraton and Chateau Hotels. Banks are also situated in Oxford Street near the Koala Greetings Hotel. There are also several banks situated in "Haymarket", a short walk from the competition centre. Best known banking groups are: Westpac Bank, Commonwealth Bank, State Bank, ANZ Bank and National Bank.

SOUVENIRS:

The widest range of souvenirs of Australia can be found at "The Rocks" area in the city, a short bus ride from the competition centre. Catch any bus marked "Circular Quay" on George Street. There are also many Duty Free shops in the city, and the Queen Victoria Building in George Street, near the Town Hall is also recommended.

FOOD:

At the competition site lunch will be provided for competitors, experts, team leaders, official and technical delegates, official observers and workshop masters. Accompanying people and observers can purchase snacks at the site or visit one of the scores of small restaurants and coffee shops in Haymarket or in the main city area. Chinatown is situated in Dixon Street, a short walk from the competition centre.
