

WORLDSKILLS, UK Alumni member who is eagerly awaiting the start of WorldSkills London 2011 is 74 year old Doug Hill. Doug holds the coveted title of being the UK's first competitor at WorldSkills, winning a Silver Medal in wood working at Madrid in 1953.

Doug has fond memories of his time competing, not least the 48 hour journey it took him to get to the event! Doug and his father set off from Kent for Madrid in their Vauxhall Velox with Doug's tools and bespoke loom threaded with the Spanish flag that he had prepared for the competition. But they almost didn't make it when the car started cutting out on the way into Spain. Luckily a mechanic was on hand and with no spare parts available fixed the engine with a cork from a wine bottle to ensure Doug made the start of the competition.

The preparation Doug undertook for WorldSkills was very different from the training programme many of our more recent Alumni members have completed. Having learned his trade as an Apprentice in his father's loom factory, Doug had no dedicated training manager to help support his preparation for the Competition. Instead he learned his trade from his father and colleagues in the factory. Doug is amazed when he learns of the training undertaken by today's competitors but believes this only highlights how important taking part in the WorldSkills Competition is; not only for the individual competitors' career but for UK industry as

Arriving in Madrid, Doug presented his work to the international judges and demonstrated his skills. He was presented to General Franco at the El Prado Palace where he received his silver medal.

Brimming with confidence his WorldSkills experience, Doug returned to the UK to complete his apprenticeship as a Woodworker in the Douglas Andrew Ltd's Loom Factory before being called up for national service. Doug then worked in the City of London before becoming a partner in his Uncle's business which produced show cards. Having inherited his father's entrepreneurial skills Doug spotted an opportunity to break into a new and emerging market. Doug changed his existing workforce from engineers to woodworkers and set about making high quality notice boards. The business was a success and Hill Brothers Service Itd supplied notice boards to businesses up and down the country including Norwich Union, Natwest and the Bank of England. The Company was also responsible for creating the first ever flight indicator board for Heathrow airport.

Now in his retirement, Doug is finally enjoying his passion for trains by helping to rebuild a steam engine at Didcot Heritage Centre. In this role Doug has learned new skills and has been able to pass on his knowledge to the next generation of workers, an excellent example of life long learning.


AS AUTUMN approaches and the 2010/11 WorldSkills UK competition cycle is due to launch, the vast majority of our competition finals for 2010 have now taken place. We have been fortunate enough this year to run many of our competitions as part of larger, high-profile events such as:

Wessex Salon Culinaire at the Bournemouth International Centre on 16 March, where

three hospitality competitions took place Beauty UK at the NEC Birmingham and the Scottish Beauty Show at the Edinburgh Royal Highland played host to competition heats for the beauty sector.

Visual Merchandising took place at the InStore Show at Olympia on 29 and 30 June, with celebrity Mary Portas onsite during the last day of competition to present medals to the winning entries.

These include: Uniformed Services, Performing Arts: Acting and Musical Theatre, Made to Measure: Fashion Design and The Big Leap: Entrepreneurship. We will also no longer be running a framework of hospitality competitions; rather, we will be scouting for talent at current industry-run events to identify potential competitors for international competitions.

Joe Massie (Team UK 2009) flew the flag for Britain when he joined some of Europe's most talented florists to compete at Eurofleurs 2010, which took place at RHS Show Tatton Park, 20 - 23 July 2010.

Eurofleurs, held every four years, brings together the highest standards in competitive floristry for under 25s in Europe and competitors the opportunity to showcase their craftsmanship and skill on an international platform.


Joe and his fellow competitors were set five floristry tasks, all themed around the concept of 'Art of Tatton'. Each task enabled the competitors to demonstrate their creative and technical abilities. The competition was judged by members of the UK Floristry Judges Guild and representatives from FLORINT, the international organisation of florists.

Joe's efforts at the competition were awarded 2nd place, the highest position

ever achieved by a British competitor and he narrowly missed out on the top spot by 0.1 marks.

Joe previously represented the UK as a floristry competitor at WorldSkills Calgary in September 2009, where his fantastic performance saw him achieve a bronze medal. Joe has also achieved an impressive total of six gold medals at other national competitions, including RHS Chelsea Young Florist of the Year which he won consecutively in 2009 and this year (May 2010).

The WorldSkills London 2011 team are working to deliver an outstanding event in 2011, but our goal is to inspire more young people to be enterprising in their careers and achieve a step change in how people view their future options. That means showcasing vocational qualifications as a positive and valued choice at all levels and the skills that the country needs.

In the run up to WorldSkills London 2011 we will be working with a range of partners, sponsors and the education community to help deliver a UK-wide, threeweek celebration of skills 19 September - 9 October. By enabling as many people as

possible to 'have a go' at a range of new skills we aim to amaze and inspire people by showing them the enormous array of opportunities available and illustrating how skills can boost their employability. We envisage lots of opportunities for Alumni members, colleges and employers to get involved so we'll keep you informed as plans develop.

To make sure the three-week celebration has maximum impact early preparation is vital. That's why, from October to December 2010, we will be launching a number of 'activation packs' and 'toolkits' on the website. This information will ensure that partners, sponsors, teachers and volunteers have the practical advice and resources they need to help us deliver a wide-range of imaginative events and activities in the run up to WorldSkills London 2011.

VOLUNTEERS are crucial to WorldSkills London 2011 – in fact they are so essential that without their involvement we would not be able to stage the event.

In October 2010 we will also be releasing important information for member countries about how to register and about the packages available for visiting teams. We will also be trialling our education resources at Skills London and on the website.

On 17 November, UK Skills will be announcing Squad UK at the Association of Colleges Conference and briefing the college community about WorldSkills London 2011.

When people ask you about WorldSkills London 2011 what should you say and how can you be sure you're using the right facts and figures?

The WorldSkills London 2011 marketing team has compiled a quick checklist to make sure Alumni members and other key spokespeople have the right information to hand...

How will WorldSkills London make a difference?

- Every community and business in the UK thrives on skills, enterprise and inspiration: WorldSkills London 2011 will be the catalyst that sparks the ambitions of people across the country.
- WorldSkills London 2011 will amaze people by showing them the endless possibilities their futures could hold and inspire them to gain expertise at the highest level to provide the UK needs.
- WorldSkills London 2011 aims to help create a lasting legacy in the UK, where the awareness and perception of vocational education and skills will undergo a positive step change.
- Involvement with the competition provides huge benefits for everyone, whether they are a participant, visitor, employer or sponsor.

The numbers.

- 150,000 people are expected to attend
- 1,000 competitors will be taking part
- 50 nations will be competing
- 45 skills will feature as competitions
- 4 days of competition will be taking place

The event...

What?

- WorldSkills is a unique global competition where young people from across the world compete to become the best of the best. At stake: the honour of being the greatest in the world at their chosen skill.
- The competition takes place every two years WorldSkills London 2011, hosted by the UK, will be the 41st WorldSkills Competition.

When

- The event will be held from 5th to 8th October 2011 at
- In the run up to WorldSkills London 2011, celebrations will take place across the UK to ensure everyone can show how skills shape their world. (Look out for details in future issues of the Alumni Newsletter.)

Who?

- Competitors are young people generally aged 22 or under (apart from a few exceptions where the upper age limit is 25) – who excel at a particular skill.
- Many countries, including the UK, hold extensive local and regional heats before selecting their national teams, so representatives at the global level truly are the very best of the best.

How?

- WorldSkills London 2011 will involve over 1,000 competitors from 50 nations competing in 45 vocational skills over four days of intense competition.
- Young people compete for medals in 45 categories from six sectors, ranging from creative arts and fashion to transportation and logistics.
- Competitors vie for the chance to win gold, silver or bronze medals, while medallions for excellence are also awarded to competitors who achieve the international standard.

So it's going to be big then?

- WorldSkills is the largest international vocational skills competition in the world and London looks set to be the biggest and best yet. The scale of the event is enormous:
- ExCeL London has over 90,000m² of space, the equivalent of ten Wembley Stadium pitches.
- About 150,000 visitors are expected, which would fill the Royal Albert Hall 27 times over.

How will we do?

- Team UK ranked seventh in the World at Calgary 2009, up four places since the competition in Shizuoka, Japan, in 2007.
- For WorldSkills London 2011 the targets for Team UK are high: a team entry to 30 skills competitions; 10 medals, of which five should be gold; and a top five ranking.

And who do we need to beat?

- South Korea has topped the medal table for the past two competitions, coming second in 2005 Japan, Brazil and Switzerland also rank consistently highly.
- The Australians are another team to watch, ranking fifth in 2007 and dropping down to sixth in Calgary. They are sure to want to regain their place in the top five in 2011.
- to want to regain their place in the top five in 2011.

 Germany has dropped down the table in recent years, from a fourth place ranking in 2005 to eleventh in 2009.
- The USA also has some work to do if it is to become a major player in the competition – the past two tournaments have seen the Americans coming in thirty-first place.

My Skills Story...

I KNEW VERY little about Stonemasonry when I applied for an Apprenticeship at the age of 16. Less than five years later, after a huge amount of dedication, determination and training I became a World Champion in Stonemasonry winning the silver medal at WorldSkills Helsinki 2005.

My journey to WorldSkills started whilst I was working towards my apprenticeship at Lloyd and Smith Ltd based in Oldham. I found out about the Competition and I found out wanted to get involved. began competing in SkillBuild competitions, which are run by Construction Skills in partnership with UK Skills. Following success at this competition, I spent the next year working with UK Skills to prepare myself for the rigours of international competition with the hope of securing a place in Team UK. As part of my training I worked with letter cutters, template makers, lecturers and tutors based all around the country. I honed my skills and won the chance to represent the UK and compete against the best of the best at WorldSkills.

After putting in the reparation and having preparation some incredible support from

my employer and training Kevin manager, Calpin; walking away with the Silver Medal has to be my WorldSkills highlight. The experience of competing at this level has been a springboard for my career in the industry and has set out a promising future in front of me.

Since competing at WorldSkills, I have tried to stay involved with the work of UK Skills. The high level of training that I received from the organisation has been invaluable and I now have the opportunity to pass on my knowledge to the two apprentices I currently work with. In the run up to WorldSkills Calgary 2009, I was invited to be a second marker at the Team Selection competition. It was great meeting the competitors and witnessing how passionate they were about being good at their job and wanting to achieve great things. This made working with them a real pleasure.

I'm still employed by for Lloyd and Smith Ltd who have put so much time and interest in to my career since I first started competing. I now hold the position of Contracts Manager and I'm currently

running a £1.2 million project on an 18th century gothic church in Manchester. I have climbed the career ladder from apprentice to the management team in a relatively short space of time. My responsibilities include overseeing the production and quality of all the work produced. I'm also responsible for training the 15 strong workforce employed by Lloyd and Smith Ltd. I continue to build on my skills and hope to be in a position to take over the running of the company in the next 5 to 10 years.

Looking forward WorldSkills London 2011, I hope Team UK achieve great things as the opportunities waiting for those talented individuals will be vast. Looking at the past successes of Team UK the medal count is rising at quite a rate and it will hopefully continue to do so. Whatever the outcome of the competition the whole of the UK has the opportunity to witness quality workmanship and skills from around the world. This can only encourage young people to want to learn more about what they have seen and help us build a talented workforce for the future.

VQ DAY 2010


23 JUNE SAW the third annual VQ Day celebrating vocational success throughout the UK. National events were held in London, Cardiff, Edinburgh and Belfast with over 300 colleges, learning providers employers getting involved in the celebrations.

For the first time 4 million qualifications vocational were achieved in the United Kingdom - a 12 per cent increase on the previous year. This shows the progress that has been made in the past year. A big congratulations to all those that have achieved vocational success in the past 12 months.

This year VQ Day's English celebration took place at the Royal Horticultural Halls in London. The day was split into two halves; the first part of the day involved over 100 senior business leaders debating the impact and the future of vocational qualifications in the workplace. This included a panel of contributors from McDonalds, Whitbread. Merseytravel and Clugstons Construction who are all committed to vocational qualifications in workplace. Feedback from the session showed that employers want a greater recognition of vocational qualifications.

Entertainment icon Arlene Phillips OBE, hosted the afternoon session which was attended by nearly 400 teachers, students, opinion MPs, learning providers and employers. There were 19 interactive zones showcasing vocational excellence such as furniture making, forensic science, media make up, auto mechanics and confectionary. All zones allowed guests to sample the variety of practical learning opportunities that are available.
